

An inspiring story from Narrogin YouthCARE

Christian Values Education in Narrogin

Karlene Toms recently retired as one of YouthCARE's longest serving Christian Values Education volunteers and said goodbye to past and present students at a farewell school assembly.

Karlene has run CVE programs in Narrogin Primary School for thirty years. She had planned to move to the Philippines to be a missionary when members of her church asked her to provide a CRE program to a grade five class that was known for their disruptive behaviour. On her first day Karlene said the supposedly troublesome class sat in silence, captivated by the bible stories she was teaching. It was then she was certain her role as CVE volunteer was meant to be.

“My first day a student came and asked me if I thought God was dead. Overwhelmed by the thought that children had never heard of the Bible, I knew I had a purpose,” she said.

Karlene has had a huge impact on the school over the past thirty years, seeing generations of families pass through.

“My favourite part of being a volunteer has been the children and building relationships with them. I love seeing their eyes light up as I share with them different stories of the Bible.”



Where have we come from? Bedford Methodist Church

Bedford Methodist Church, began in November 1952, at the home of Terry and Elsie Neville, 108 Birkett Street, in the rapidly growing, outer- city suburb of Bedford Park ("Park" was later dropped).

It was soon apparent that a building was needed and a small Church hall, 40ft x 25ft, with a small front porch, was built at the corner of Craven Street and Shaftesbury Avenue and opened on 9th October 1954. The congregation grew rapidly. In 1959 a 10ft addition was added to the back, and a 20ft x 20ft room to the back NE corner. The Sunday School peaked at 250 and the congregation at 150!

Sunday School Anniversaries were something special, with the Junior and Intermediate classes on the installed platform for the morning service; the Kindergarten (40x 4-6 year olds at one stage!) in the afternoon; and the Senior and Young Peoples groups in the evening! Junior, Intermediate and YP Christian Endeavour groups were a wonderful training ground for Christian commitment and leadership in the future!

A large active Ladies Guild was behind much of the fund-raising, and along with the Men's Fellowship, (rare at that time!) ran the popular film nights and fetes. Big fetes! The church held the stalls of fresh home-made produce; the side room served morning teas; and under umbrellas on the lawns were stalls of hand-crafted items – including one just for aprons!! There were games for the children and a train ride on a track between the buildings and the side fence! These were great times of fellowship and where lasting friendships were nurtured amongst those families.

Sadly, the church building no longer exists, it closed on Sunday 12th September 1999, most of the congregation went to the new Noranda church; but the legacy of that congregation lives on. Many of the young people married others from within that group, and now today, with children and grandchildren of their own, are active members in congregations across the metropolitan area and beyond. It was the BEST place to grow up – the nurture, the teaching, the leadership, the fellowship and the friendship, still mean so much to so many of us. This is clearly seen, when there is a funeral service of one of those foundation members. Their friends are aging too now, and many unable to attend, but it is the "young people" who are now present to pay their respects, and remember past times.

Wherever we go into the future, memories will always be a treasured part of our background. We thank our Almighty God, for those precious people who led, guided and nurtured us, and helped shape who we are today.

When I asked June Morrell if I could write a story about her, she replied, "Why I'm no-one important!"

How wrong she is! June is 93 years young. Born in Bruce Rock, her parents moved to Pinjarra when she was nearly 3 years old. She married and raised her family in Pinjarra. Until she married, June regularly attended worship with her mother in the Anglican church.

June and her husband, Denzil met at school and in 1947 married and settled on a virgin block, 10 kilometres north of Pinjarra. Life was hard as they chipped out a living and developed the lovely property the family have to this day.

Denzil and June were involved in Trinity Methodist (now Uniting) Church, Pinjarra. They became more involved as their three children grew. June ran the Methodist Sunday School Kindergarten, with 39 children on the role. Her class met in the CWA rooms because the church couldn't accommodate all the classes.

Regular worship services were held at 7.30 pm each Sunday evening, once a month there was a morning service at which the Kindergarten presented a special item. This brought parents and friends. June not only ran the Kindergarten, there were church flowers, and the Ladies Guild who worked tirelessly to raise funds to extend the church. Her comment "Oh those Paddy Markets!"

Just prior to Christmas 1954, the minister, Rev. Bill McNair, visited, and told June there wasn't an organist for Christmas day! June explained she was out of practice, she didn't have a piano and rarely had the opportunity to play. The minister left it with her and she played for that 1954 Christmas service and has been doing so ever since.

Pinjarra, had several preaching places and June played for the annual Guild Festival days at Bunbury, Harvey or Collie. Denzil and June built a tennis court near their farmhouse where the youth and congregation had, many great times. Today the Sunday school and congregation still go to the Morrell's and enjoy picnics.

That's quite remarkable, 63 years of unselfish service. When June decided to leave the farm, she went to live in Bullcreek. She has regularly driven the 80 plus kilometres to Pinjarra, Sunday by Sunday, to play the piano during the service. She no longer must pump away on a pedal organ but she is always there to accompany the other musicians. We miss her when she takes a holiday.

Thank you, good and faithful servant. This is a great story of love and dedication and we thank God for you June.

On the 21st June, we celebrated the 40th Anniversary of the Uniting church in Australia, with three wonderful speakers and special cakes.

Rev Geoff Blyth as a participant in the uniting process, gave us an understanding of the lengthy discussions, debate, planning and scrutiny, that took place, before anything formal could be done. He was present at the inaugural service on 22nd June 1977, held in the Sydney Town Hall, and commented on how moving it was to those gathered.

The members of the constituent congregations of Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational, met first in their own city churches, for the official signing of the last documents, and closing of those denominations. They then walked through Sydney to the Town Hall for the celebratory induction service of the new UNITING CHURCH. It was a very special and exciting time. The trip back to WA was a bit hair-raising, with Ansett Airways threatening to strike, and the key people in leading our own WA service the following day, wondering if they would be stranded in Sydney. However they made it on the last plane out!!

Our second speaker, Alexandra Bingham, wasn't even born when the Uniting Church came into being! She is now the Co-ordinator of Partnerships for Uniting World in WA and SA. Alexandra shared about some of the projects in which Uniting World is involved, working alongside people in disadvantaged communities, and empowering them in very positive ways. She initially trained in filmmaking and photography, but had her beliefs challenged when she went to the Philippines in 2012. She made a pact with God, to give her three signs to convince her to do volunteer work. He actually gave her four! In 2016, she returned to the Philippines to do 12 months as a volunteer. It was really encouraging to hear from somebody so enthusiastic about her faith, who has grown up with-in the Uniting Church, and to know that God continues to speak to our young people.

Our third speaker Rev David Tressler, came from another denomination, into the Uniting Church about 1984. David held up his VERY well-worn copy of "The Basis of Union", and said it was, the inspired and clear wording within-in that book, that drew him to the Uniting Church, and gave him a renewed vision for his ministry. It has certainly been our gain to have David as a Minister of the Uniting Church in WA.

We can thank God for what has been achieved over the last 40 years, and we can look forward with hope and faith for the next 40 years and beyond.

As we left we were encouraged to take a celebratory cake with us. kindly made by Elsie and Dulcie. . . . a muffin sized fruit cake, with white icing and a red "40" on top of each. Thank you, ladies. It was a lovely thought and delicious as well.

In a quote from Bruce Plowman, the first patrol padre, "though the way be long, the road rough and lonely, the cost great – well, we must just go on until the remotest Inlanders know that they are part of our life, and their lives part of ours."

In a recent update from the Pilbara Patrol Rev. John Dihm wrote about the work from his Tom Price base. The Patrol covers an area as large as Victoria. Within its boundaries are forty stations, eight mining camps, one gas camp and three national parks.

The work of the Pilbara Patrol has changed in the last four years. John arrived in Tom Price in 2013 and was involved with the town and its people. In April 2013, Rio Tinto had a suicide at one of their camps. John was invited to attend and offer help to all on site. Since then he has been very involved with mining camps, working with the mining company in mental health of their FIFO workers. Out of this has come 'I care'. This program is used in all Rio Tinto construction sites with John's role growing stronger and bigger with each project. He now leads services on site for those who wish to attend.

John visits stations along the way, spending special time with the people there. He is also involved in a number of community organizations in Tom Price, as well as being Police Chaplain for the Pilbara Region. A relationship with the National Park Rangers is another facet leading to John conducting services in the Karijini Park for visitors in tourist season.

John continues with his ANZAC Day and Long Tan Day at the 80 mile beach with the Vietnam Veterans, visiting stations in that area along the way. In his update, John quoted many versus from Psalm 121.

Recently, Outback Links work party led by Sturt/Parkin Patrol Minister Rev. Paul Glazbrook went on a spirit raising trip to William Creek South Australia. This is one of the most remote communities in Australia. Situated on the Oonadatta Track with a permanent population of six, but a vital community hub for stations in the area and travelers on the track. Following previous consultation with the community the Outback Links Group completed a list of extensive repairs and renovations to refresh the Bronco and Gymkhana Ground in time for the National Bronco Branding Championship in August. The Rev. Paul Glazbrook says, "It's amazing what can happen when people say 'here I am use me.'"

The Mission Fellowship Group is doing amazing work preparing used stamps for sale, proceeds of which go to support Patrol Ministry.

September is the month dedicated to the Great Outback Barbecue. However anytime in Spring or Summer would be just as acceptable. Visit the Frontier Services Website to register and receive the Host Pack full of information and helpful tips.

The figures for the 2016 Census are now available. News reports gave some preliminary findings, some with the statement "Losing my religion," the title of a popular song by the rock group REM in the 1990s. The number of people stating "No Religion" has been increasing each census – from 18.7% in 2006 to 22.3% in 2011 and is now 29.6% – up more than 10% in ten years. I suspect it is less a matter of people losing their religion as being more willing to say they were not connected to any religion. This was helped by putting "No Religion" the first option in the census list. Our society is predominantly secular and materialistic so the census figures understandably reflect this. We do well to note that Christianity still represents 52% of the population.

Catholics continue to be the largest religious group with 22.6% of the population down from 25.3% in 2011. Given the bad publicity surrounding the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse, it is no wonder that many no longer call themselves Catholic. Yet it was the Anglicans who had the biggest loss in terms of nominal adherents. Over half a million people less said they were Anglican. Anglicans now represent 13.3% of the population. The Uniting Church also saw a significant loss of people saying they were nominally linked, down more than 190,000. The Uniting Church is now 3.7% of the population. Its social services continue to mean it is a major contributor to Australian life. It is in fact the largest non-government welfare provider with its aged care, child care, Lifeline centres etc. The multiethnic composition of the Uniting Church is increasingly significant. The Tongan National Conference organised by the Uniting Church had some 1,500 people recently. There are many Korean congregations and there is a Korean presbytery in NSW. People worship in 26 languages across the Uniting Church as well as in many indigenous languages.

Islam has received frequent attention in the media, especially due to radical voices here and overseas and those joining terrorist groups such as Islamic State. Most Muslims want to live peacefully in Australia as Australians. They now represent 2.6% of the population and have overtaken the Buddhists who have 2.4%. Hindus have grown to 1.9%. They are here to stay as part of our Australian society.

Australia is a secular, multicultural, multiethnic, multi-religious society. While this is not new it is increasingly the case. The Australian population is now some 24.4 million people having doubled in the past 50 years. Those 50 years have also seen Australia become very multicultural having abandoned the notorious "white Australia policy." In the past five years there have been 1.3 million new migrants from 180 countries. We are a country made up of an ever-increasing number of

people from all kinds of cultural backgrounds. After World War II it was people from Europe who were assisted to migrate to Australia. Middle Eastern people have come and continue to do so, such as people fleeing the violence in Syria. Pacific Islanders have come to make Australia home though they continue to have strong links to their countries of origin. Africans, such as from Sudan, have recently migrated here. However, it is people from Asia who are the majority of new migrants, especially from China and India.

Overall the number of people born overseas is 26.3% of the population. If you add parents born overseas, it is nearly 50%. Sydney and Melbourne are the cities with the greatest mix of people which is not surprising as New South Wales and Victoria are the most populous states. Two thirds of our population live in the capital cities with Sydney the largest at 4.8 million.

It is also worth noting that while many former mainstream churches are aging, so too is the population. One in six people are over 65 years of age. Ministry with older Australians is important and governments will have to provide adequately for an increasing number of older people.

The census is a snapshot of present Australia that represents a challenge to churches and to governments. How do we read the figures and respond appropriately? Governments need to think in terms of providing infrastructure especially in the growing cities but not forgetting rural people, and for the people who are in need, such as those who cannot afford housing, have disabilities, or are aging.

Churches should recognise the reality of the context which is no longer favourable to them. Sunday is just another day or a day for sport for many. Younger people are attracted to other younger people and technology. Older people can no longer do all the tasks that they willingly did in their mid-years. However, we also need to be discerning the new thing God's Spirit is doing. The challenge for churches in a less supportive and at times antagonistic environment is in fact the ongoing one of assisting people to become, grow and serve as genuine followers of Jesus Christ and not just be nominal in their allegiance. All churches are to point people to Jesus Christ and his message of God's reign of compassion, justice and peace and serve God's mission in the world.

World-wide Christianity continues to grow with China likely to become a source of active Christians not only in China but around the world. Many cities now have strong ethnic congregations and they are made up of whole families. Sports stars from ethnic communities are more likely to be openly Christian. My Uniting Church is aware of this change and is seeking to adapt appropriately to enable people to become and live as disciples of Jesus Christ serving God and the community.
