Hearing from the Heart: A Service and Resources

In 1994, the Uniting Church of Australia made a commitment to:

- work in solidarity with the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress (UAICC) for the advancement of God's kingdom of justice and righteousness;
- advocate for national and state policy changes to redress structural disadvantage; and
- respect Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' right to selfdetermination.

In the Covenanting Statement to the UAICC Chairperson, the President of the Seventh Assembly said:

Long before my people came to this land your people were here. You were nurtured by your traditions, by the land, and by the Mystery that surrounds us all and binds all creation together.

My people did not hear you when you shared your understanding and your Dreaming.

Centuries and decades later, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people are still asking to be heard. Later this year, a Referendum will be held to enshrine an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice in Australia's Constitution.

The Uniting Church of Australia supports the proposal. Our current Assembly President, Reverend Hollis, has described the Voice to Parliament as a moral and theological issue, not a political one: "Like Jesus, we are called to be bearers of justice, not just in our words, but in our actions and by changing systems which continue to deny the place and rights of the first Australians."

This document contains resources, prayers and reflections that have been collated by the Social Justice Commission of the Western Australian Synod to assist worship communities to reflect on what it means to be "bearers of justice" in relation to the upcoming Referendum.

Worship communities are encouraged to use this resource to organise a service around the theme of "Hearing from the Heart". The service can be held in any week before the Referendum which is which will take place on 14 October 2023.

At the 47th Annual Meeting of the Synod of WA, the Covenanting Commission brought this worship resource before the meeting, commending to Synod the resources assembled by Daniel Vujcich, from the Social Justice Commission for congregations and other places of worship to feel free to use in worship services leading up to the Voice referendum. This was approved by the Synod in session.

INTRODUCTION TO THEME

In the Uluru Statement from the Heart, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander delegates described a Voice to Parliament as the next logical step in a long journey for justice and recognition: "In 1967 we were counted, in 2017 we seek to be heard." Six years have passed since that gentle and generous invitation to "walk with us in a movement of the Australian people for a better future." Later this year, a constitutional referendum will determine whether that vision for a better future is realised.

The Catholic Archbishop of Melbourne, Peter Comensoli, describes the Ulu<u>r</u>u Statement as a gift but notes:

A gift, however, only has value if there is a receiver who welcomes it openly and humbly. The exchange then becomes an act of love. ... Jesus said, 'Look, I am standing at the door knocking. If one of you hears me calling and opens the door, I will come in to share a meal with that person and that person with me.' ... That sense, of a friend coming to meet us, even in difficult circumstances, offers a way forward in understanding the meaning of the Statement's words and intent. This is the form, the living heart, of the Statement (from, Statements from the Soul: The Moral Case for the Uluru Statement from the Heart).

The 2023 Referendum is not about party politics. It is a request from a persecuted but proud minority to have their voice heard on the lands from which they have been dispossessed.

This is a recurring theme in our Scriptures whose pages are filled with marginalised people straining to have their voices heard. The miracle of the Christian faith is that God sent a Messiah who taught us to listen to these voices with open hearts, and to create spaces for us to have dialogues with those whose lives and liberties have been pushed into the margins.

¹³ The reason I speak to them in parables is that 'seeing they do not perceive, and hearing they do not listen, nor do they understand.' ¹⁴ With them indeed is fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah that says: 'You will indeed listen but never understand, and you will indeed look but never perceive. ¹⁵ For this people's heart has grown dull, and their ears are hard of hearing, and they have shut their eyes, so that they might not look with their eyes, and hear with their ears and understand with their heart and turn— and I would heal them.'

REFLECTION

God who listens, open our hearts to hear the gentle invitation of those without a voice; placeless and dispossessed of all that was theirs, instead of anger, revenge or blame, they offer in their open hand absurd generosity, an act of transformational forgiveness from the centre of their being to ours:

May we sense the integrity of country speaking to country, body to body; and find within ourselves the humility to accept and journey together, to become our nation's better future, resolving our colonial memory, Australia's original sin.

As Jesus gave his body for ours, help us to receive and pass on this gift of new life, for his name's sake. Amen.
