Welcome to the first edition of Newslink for 2024.

You may recall receiving an invitation to the National Gathering to be held at Nunyara Conference Centre Belair, in the Adelaide Hills between 22 – 27 January 2024. Nunyara is an Aboriginal word meaning 'place of healing'.



We were a small group of 20 people. Along with members of the National Committee and some State UCAF Fellowship members we enjoyed the company of the President of the Assembly Rev Sharon Hollis, Olive' Tanielu, Chairperson of the South Pacific Unit of the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church Women, and guest speakers Rev Mark Schultz our Bible study leader, and the Moderator of the S.A. Synod Rev Peter Morrell. Our elective guests 'Living well/ Finishing well relating our life journey to seasons of the year, and 'Trash to Art' reusing containers and items we frequently see as rubbish to create other decorative and useful items.

We were very comfortably accommodated in single or shared rooms with delicious meals prepared by the catering staff employed by the Centre. The weather varied from pleasant, to cold, to raining on the day of our bus trip to Mt. Lofty shrouded in fog and on to Hahndorf where we visited the shops to avoid getting soaked by the rain.

It was a special time of fellowship with reports from State Fellowships, times of worship, theological reflection, and giving thanks remembering those who had been part of UCAF who have died since the last Consultation gathering. The future of the National UCAF Committee was the main item of business.

No nominations were received for the positions of Chairperson, Secretary, or Treasurer and it was therefore concluded that the ministry of the National Committee will conclude from 30 June 2024.

There is business to be concluded at the end of the financial year regarding interactions with Assembly, the *Joan Stott Bursary*, and other matters. This decision, however, does not affect the State UCAF groups in their meetings and projects.

World Day of Prayer is celebrated on the first Friday in March each year. This ecumenical gathering will focus on the country of Palestine in 2024. The theme is *"I Beg You......Bear with One Another in Love"* words taken from Ephesians 4: 1 – 7. How we need to pray for the whole of the Middle East at this time in world history, being caught up in conflict, war, homelessness, and life as refugees. May we lift up our prayers to God that soon there may be peace and justice as we use the words in this service from the Palestinian Christian women.

We have begun our Easter journey for 2024 having celebrated Ash Wednesday on 14 February, the beginning of Lent, our time of preparation for Easter. Included in this edition of Newslink are some prayers you may wish to use during your Easter preparation.

Disability becomes Ability

We were so pleased to hear that in 2023 the Synod of Western Australia passed a motion for a policy to be formulated for the Church to move forward to invite people with disabilities into the life of taking part in services and journeying into the life of the church, and sharing paths where possible.

With this in mind, on January 7, 2024, a church service was held at Pinjarra Uniting Church, where three people with disabilities shared their stories and participated in the service at the Church Council's generous invitation. It was a beautiful sharing service, we heard about the difficulties each had experienced along the way, and the people who had helped and prayed for them. This sharing of stories made me realise how God brought people into our lives to help and nurture those with the greatest needs, and never, never underestimate the power of prayer.

Looking at the future we hope there will be more welcoming of persons with a disability, seen or unseen, to tell their stories, and participate in the life and times of the Church. The Synod is working on a *Disability Access and Inclusion Plan* booklet to be sent later this year to all Congregations, to help the Church become more disability-friendly, exploring spirituality together, and deepening the experience of the Holy Spirit working in our lives. Remember, WE ARE ALL MADE IN THE IMAGE OF GOD, whatever we have to offer, God can use it.

Pinjarra Uniting Church has started the ball rolling, and we hope that there will be at least one service a year organised, and this will flow into other Church Communities. Perhaps we can hope in the future there will be a regular *Disability Sunday* in the Church calendar.

Learning from the Easter Story

I LOVE Easter. I love taking the time during Holy Week to pause and reflect on the final days of Jesus' life: His arrival in Jerusalem not on a horse (which would have been a symbol of power and authority) but on a donkey; His example of grace and humility as He washed the feet of the disciples (while they bickered amongst themselves about who would be the greatest); sharing a meal with a bunch of oddballs and misfits (whom he knew would betray and deny him).

Isn't it interesting that Jesus doesn't retaliate or condemn those seeking to betray, deny or even kill him? Instead, he cries out "*Father*, *forgive them*" (*Luke 23:34-43*). **This is grace**. This is such amazing grace it is hard to comprehend.

In fact, if you remember when Jesus was being arrested, Peter (in what appears to be in defence of Jesus) drew his sword and cut off the ear of the soldier. Jesus rebuked Peter and said "*No more of this*," as he healed the soldier's ear (*Luke 22:49*).

There's just something about the Easter story that highlights:

- Humility, instead of power.
- Serving others, instead of ruling over others.
- Including, instead of excluding.
- Forgiveness, instead of revenge.
- Hope, instead of hopelessness
- Love, instead of hate.

The Easter story reminds us that the gospel message is about grace, peace, freedom, forgiveness, hope, inclusion and love. Jesus said: "*I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full.*" (John 10:10).

If our words are not life-giving, and instead we use scripture as a weapon to hurt, wound and tear others apart, then we are no different to Peter who injured the soldier. Like Jesus, we must say "No more of this." Instead, let's choose to walk the path Jesus walked.



Disaster Recovery Bush Chaplain farewells the Midwest!

Freeing someone from their isolation can be as simple as sitting with them, and having a chat.

But when sharing that company means sacrificing time with your friends, your family, and your home, it isn't as simple as that. It takes immense strength not to succumb to that same isolation.



As a Disaster Recovery Bush Chaplain, David Jackson's embodiment of mateship, travelling through remote Australia to stand with people in tough times, has been a salve to this pervasive isolation.

In the heart of the Mid West, where days often reach a scorching 40°C, David has been an ongoing presence and a source of comfort for those navigating the challenges of remote life. Shortly after Cyclone Seroja swept through the region, destroying entire communities, David arrived to support people who had lost everything.

"I came out of early retirement for this Bush Chaplaincy role, and it's been a journey filled with meaningful connections and purposeful moments."

As David will concede, it's a journey that has called for personal sacrifice.

Mateship in the midst of hardship

In the bush, not all challenges are things that can be overcome. Often, they are simply things that must be accepted. Spending time away from his home, David faced the same harsh realities of isolation and uncertainty as the people he sought to serve. There was no escaping it, even for someone with a stable home hundreds of kilometres away.

For many in the community, catastrophic events like cyclones, floods, fires and droughts compounded huge personal challenges. Challenges arising from the pressure of isolation.

For David, a sense of purpose gave him the strength he needed to continue.

"It's not always easy, but knowing that I'm making a difference, that I'm providing support, makes it all worthwhile."

For the people he spent time getting to know over a cuppa, having a dependable mate show up has eased the pain of eternal hardships. Knowing that someone else knew what they were going through and cared, has made the long stints of solitude bearable.

Attending Kalbarri's weekly Seniors Group, coordinating regular ecumenical services, and arranging regular house visits to people needing a hand; David has walked alongside people and groups of all backgrounds with unwavering dedication. It hasn't gone unnoticed.

"People warm to David's presence in the Midwest," says Kathy, a local community member in Morawa.

His ability to connect with communities of all faiths and backgrounds, offering support and encouragement, has helped to establish a sustainable network of support. David is optimistic that as he transitions to a new placement in the Pilbara, more than one thousand kilometres northeast of the Midwest, this network will survive with new torchbearers.

Looking ahead to the Pilbara

In the Pilbara, David plans to continue his work of connecting with communities, joining together with mining camps, roadhouses, First Nations communities, and other local organisations. There is still sacrifice, but this time David will have his wife, Di, by his side.

Just as David committed himself to sharing the weight of isolation with others, Di accompanies David to make his vital work possible.

As David prepares to immerse himself in this new chapter of ministry, he brings with him the lessons learned and the connections forged in the Midwest.

Although the landscapes may change, his commitment to serving others continues in the country's most remote corners.



Juniper: Meet Nicky and Mimco

When three-year-old greyhound Mimco bounds through the doors at Juniper Sarah Hardey Residential Aged Care Home in Kelmscott, the collective smiles she brings to the faces of residents and staff are enough to melt your heart.

Due to their calm, sensitive and friendly nature, greyhounds are suitable companions for people of ALL ages, including children and seniors.

Mimco's owner, Nicky Taylor - who has worked at Juniper Sarah Hardey as a domestic cleaner for the past two years - has been bringing the spritely canine to the home every week for the past five months.

Having spent most of her time interacting with residents in the Memory Support Wing, there's no denying the positive impact Mimco's presence has in the home.

"She seems to trigger a lot of memory recall for residents who have dementia," Nicky said. "They seem to remember her whenever she comes to visit."

Before Mimco became a regular visitor at Sarah Hardey, residents were given the opportunity to vote for what kind of therapy animal they'd like to see at the home.

Needless to say, dogs topped the list, with Mimco earning the deserving title of Sarah Hardey's most popular four-legged companion.

"The residents absolutely adore her," Nicky said. "She just loves coming here. She gets so excited every time we walk through the doors."

The benefits of pet therapy in aged care include improved emotional well-being, reduced feelings of loneliness, depression and anxiety, as well as improvement in memory recall for residents living with dementia.

Breaking the cycle of disadvantage for mums and bubs at risk.

The first 1,000 days of a child's life are crucial for long-term development and wellbeing.

Stable housing, health care for both mother and child, and nurturing support from the people around them is something most soon-to-be mums take for granted, but women who find themselves pregnant and homeless are often lacking these resources, resulting in increased risk of losing custody after their child is born.

The inevitable result is often the perpetuation of intergenerational trauma for both the mother and the child.

Recognising the benefits of supporting mothers to recover and retain custody of their children, Uniting WA has partnered with Homeless Healthcare to launch a new initiative – called **The Together Program** – which supports pregnant women and new mothers facing homelessness, together with their babies.

The goal is to empower women in these situations, and ensure they have a range of supports that will ultimately help them maintain long-term custody of their babies.

Just after Christmas, Kayla and newborn son Zayden moved in as the very first participants of **The Together Program**. Kayla was pregnant, living on the street and just weeks off her due date when she was referred to **The Together Program** from King Edward Memorial Hospital.

We look forward to welcoming more mothers to the program throughout the year.

For Leighton, volunteering hadn't initially crossed his mind much but now he has started, he can't get enough. He regularly volunteers 2-3 shifts a week.

"You know that people are sleeping rough and are in need of essential living supplies, but as you aren't exposed to it and just read it in the newspapers or watch the TV. It is an entirely different thing when you are present and amongst those actually doing it tough".

Devotions: God surprises!

Some years ago, a couple of unrelated and totally different incidents made a real impact on me, and I remember them clearly.

Tall Timber

I was driving through the Karri forests in the beautiful South West corner of our lovely State. I had been there before with our family, admiring those majestic trees so tall and straight, and the peace and calm of the surrounding forest. I had been there too, in a bus, seeing those lovely forests from a slightly higher perspective. This time I was on my own, and I suddenly felt very small! Instead of enjoying those beautiful trees, they seemed to be closing in around me!

Then suddenly, far down the road where it took a slight bend to the right, I saw a red spot at the base of a very big tree. What was it? It puzzled me even as I drew closer to it. Then I came across a young man on the side of the road, obviously a cyclist by his clothing, taking a photograph of his bicycle leaning against that big tree, with its bright red saddle bags visible! I wondered then how small he must have felt amongst those majestic trees!

GOD SURPRISES us with His majesty and His Power at times when we least expect it! We think we are just admiring and enjoying the countryside around us, as we have done many times before until He jolts us into acknowledging that HE is our amazing Creator and Sustainer of all that is around us!

"Slumming It"

This was the title of a TV documentary about life in Mumbai, India, for the people living on a rubbish tip! About 85% of everything that went on that tip was recycled in dirty, oily, dusty, cramped, unhygienic, dangerous sheds and lean-tos, squashed in between the already crowded dwellings!

But there was a community there! Everyone knew their place and their job, brightened by the occasional deep pink of Bougainvillaea against the buildings! There had been many complaints about how unsafe it all was, and the authorities were going to bulldoze it all down and rebuild it with new clean, high-rise units.

As the commentator said, "Where would the people go in the meantime?", "What work would they then do from the new buildings?", "What would then happen to all the rubbish piling up?", and more importantly, "What would happen to the community that shared their lives there?"

His suggestion was to clean up and make safe the various little industries that were already going on, and provide good health and education services, to retain the existing community networks.

GOD SURPRISES us by showing us a way that we would not have considered or anticipated. Sometimes our solution of "get rid of the old and replace with the new" is NOT the right way to go, because people are often part of that equation as well and they matter! God cares about every one of us.

Easter Brunch Cupcakes

Ingredients:

- $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups (225g) plain flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 125g butter, softened
- 1 cup (220g) caster sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 (200g) ripe banana, mashed
- 1 cup crushed pineapple, drained
- ¹/₂ cup (55g) chopped walnuts
- ¹/₂ cup (25g) shredded coconut
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup (95g) white choc bits

Frosting:

- 500g light cream cheese, softened
- 395g tin sweetened condensed milk
- 12 small chocolate Easter eggs or Cadbury Mini Eggs

Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to 180° C/160°C fan forced. Line a 12-hole (½ cup/80ml) muffin pan with paper cases.
- 2. Sift flour and baking powder in a bowl, and reserve. Using an electric mixer, beat butter and sugar until creamy; add eggs, one at a time and whisk until combined.
- 3. Fold in sifted flour and baking powder, banana, pineapple, walnuts, coconut and white choc bits; mix well.
- 4. Divide batter evenly between paper cases; bake for 25 minutes or until golden brown and cooked through. Transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

Frosting:

In an electric mixer, beat cream cheese and sweetened condensed milk until smooth. Place mixture into a piping bag with a round nozzle, pipe frosting over cupcakes; top with a small chocolate Easter egg or 'Cadbury Mini Eggs'.
